Minnesota Department of Health Project Firstline Hand Hygiene Education Bundle

Hand hygiene is one of easiest most effective ways to prevent the spread of germs (including those resistant to antibiotics) to patients/clients/resident, health care workers, and the health care environment. Hand hygiene is cleaning hands with soap and water (e.g., soap or with antiseptic), alcohol-based hand sanitizer (ABHS), or surgical hand antisepsis. Performing hand hygiene correctly and at the right time ensures safer care and better health outcomes.


