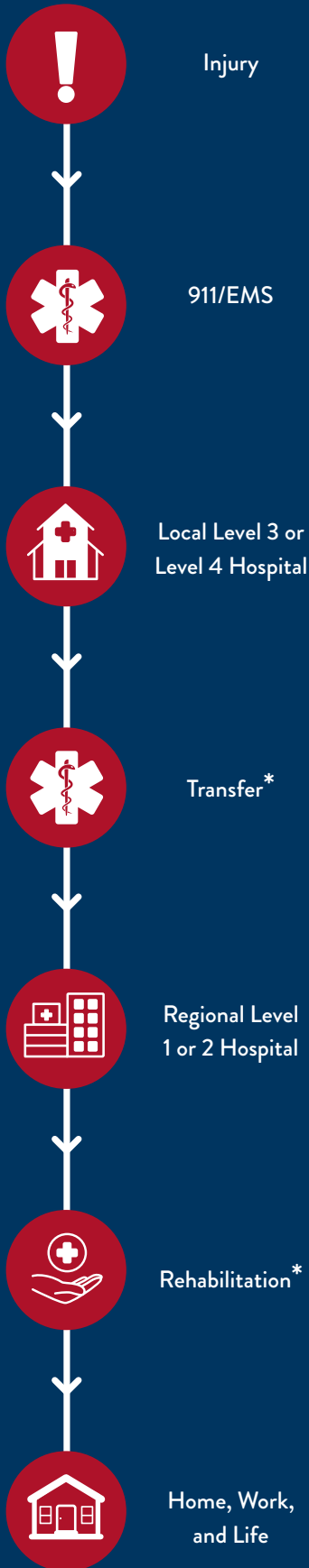


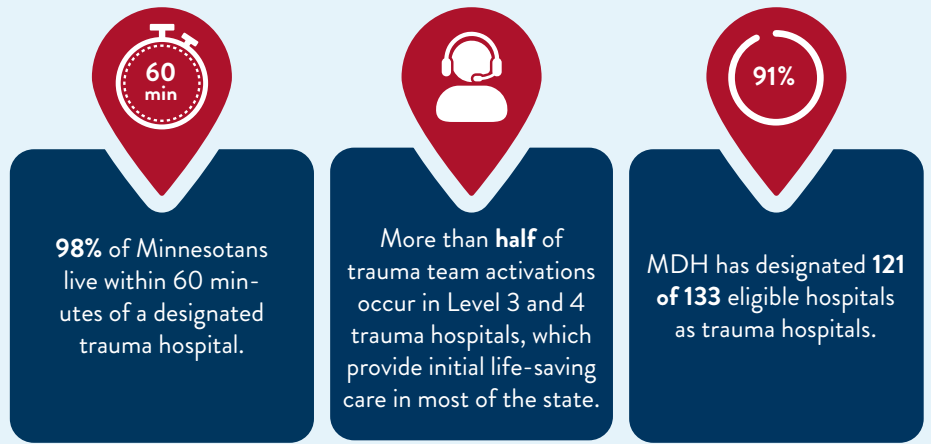

Minnesota Trauma System Achievements



What is a trauma system?

A trauma system is a network of emergency medical services (EMS) and hospitals that ensure severely injured patients are rapidly assessed, stabilized, and treated at facilities appropriate to the complexity of their injuries.

Trauma hospitals are a resource to their communities, not just for the timely and critical care they provide, but for education and injury prevention efforts for all ages.

MDH and the State Trauma Advisory Council (STAC) provide overall leadership for the system in partnership with the state's emergency medical services lead agency and the six Regional Trauma Advisory Committees (RTACs) throughout the state.

Injury: the silent public health crisis

- Trauma is the leading cause of death in Minnesotans ages 1-44.
- The number of potential years of life lost before age 65 due to unintentional injury is greater than any other cause. It is more than double cancer and cardiovascular disease combined.
- Elderly patients are disproportionately represented in Minnesota's trauma data. This highlights the need for injury prevention initiatives and timely access to trauma services for the elderly population.

Inside a designated trauma hospital

- Standardized training of staff.
- Standardized and readily accessible resuscitation equipment for all ages.
- Best practice protocols and benchmarks for treatment.
- Critical review of cases and continuous improvement of care.
- Participation in statewide data collection to improve care across the state.



Healthcare workforce shortages resulting in delays

- Workforce shortages across the state have led to chronic delays in transfer of critical patients.
- The State Trauma Advisory Council (STAC) is working with trauma hospitals on contingency plans to care for critical patients at local facilities.
